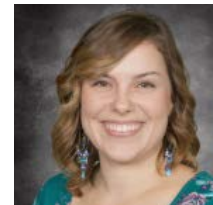

Master Planning 2.0

MNSD continues to study and gain feedback related to our facilities. In 2018, we concluded numerous building and renovation projects spanning several years and multiple facilities in our first master planning effort. The goal of Master Planning 2.0 is to examine our current state of facilities and forecast a long term plan for addressing needs that align with the 5-year strategic plan. One example of our focus is 21st century academic needs, which include Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math (STEAM). The following steps will be taken as a part of these efforts:

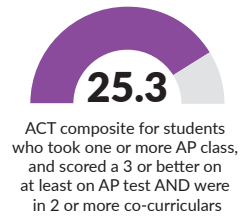
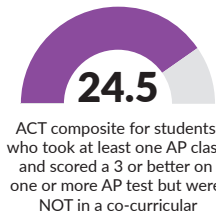
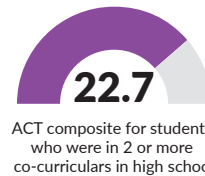
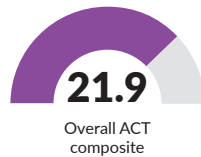
- Study current state and create a prioritized, long term, project list;

- Survey the community to gain feedback on priorities;
- Complete a population study to better understand trends and identify needs;
- Continue to explore and create private funding streams to assist in the finance of projects.

Continuous Improvement

In the true spirit of continuous improvement, Muskego-Norway Schools has adopted a powerful data visualization tool, Qualtrics, to support the District’s efforts in its use of data to drive improvement efforts. Qualtrics, often used in the private sector, has proven useful in helping companies use real time, leading data, to adjust practices, thus increasing efficiencies and profitability. To date, the District has been able to build out multiple data dashboards in our efforts to measure key components of our annual and five (5) year strategic plan. From building administrators to District staff, there is a tremendous amount of positive energy around current use and the powerful potential this tool brings to everyone’s work. In the near future, the District will be looking to utilize Qualtrics survey tools to help us measure student and parent satisfaction as well as employee engagement. Pictured below, you will see one of our most recent projects, which revealed a strong correlation between participation in co-curricular activities, Advanced Placement coursework, and the ACT composite score.



Technology Business

February 28th was National Digital Learning Day. This day was designed to celebrate the way technology can be used to teach students. We visited our elementary classes to see how they are learning to code. We also stopped by our middle schools to learn how they can have personalized learning with the use of the Chromebooks. Lakeview Elementary Inclusive Environment For All Students

Lakeview has changed their service delivery model for intervention students by providing their services in the classroom. Our interventionists, reading teachers, and math and literacy coaches work with classroom teachers to ensure all students receive the support they need during math and literacy intervention blocks. We now call these blocks WIN time or "What I Need". Students are provided additional support or extension activities depending on student needs. This also strengthens communication and collaboration between classroom teachers and interventionists. When talking with a current 4th grade student about this time, he tells us, "It's nice to be with different people this year. Kids treat you nicely and they don't look down on you for doing something wrong." Students are feeling a strong sense of belonging because they don't have to travel to a different classroom to receive additional support.

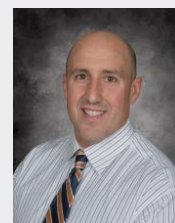
College, Career, and Community Ready

Preparing students to be college, career, and community ready begins before MNSD students even reach the high school. There are multiple readiness indicators that district leadership teams review at various times each year. In reviewing the information and data points, it informs school teams in order to capitalize on actions resulting in positive results and help drive our continuous improvement. Readiness indicators at the elementary level include reading and math proficiency at the end of first and third grade. This is when many students show growth and development from learning how to read, to reading to learn. In addition, teams also review fourth grade math proficiency. Finally, the percentage of students meeting 95% attendance (or higher) is reviewed. These indicators are just one way Muskego-Norway School District administrators and teachers are setting students on a path to be college, career, and community ready!



CONNECT Academy!

MNSD is focused on preparing students to be college, career, and community ready. During the 2018-19 school year, the district re-branded what career-based learning means in order to provide even more opportunities for students to learn, grow, and succeed. The CONNECT Academy was rolled out to parents and students in January - just in time for the 2019-2020 registration process. This academy "CONNECTS" students to community business employers. Through these connections, students benefit by learning their likes/dislikes in order to provide a greater understanding for next steps in one's academic journey. Additionally, they develop and refine their employability skills and may be eligible for earning income. Participating industry partners are excited to give back to the community, develop a pipeline, and focus on retention of talent. Examples of ways employers can get involved include: job fair participation, classroom guest speaker, industry panel speaker, 45 or 90 hour micro-internship with a student interested in the field, or host a student intern and/or youth apprentice.

Spring is near which means we are close to putting the snowy cold winter behind us. Our DPW crew appreciates the kind remarks from many regarding the quality job they do. While we sleep comfortably at night during snow storms our crew is busy at work clearing the roads for our safe travels. I'm proud to work with so many competent and dedicated employees from all areas whether it is the DPW, Planning and Engineering, Finance & Administration, Information Technology, Parks and Recreation, Library, Law and Law Enforcement.

As Muskego continues to grow in population (24,812 estimate for 2018), our roads, trails, and commercial services also increase. Over the past five years the miles of roads added were 2.29 along with 3.3 added miles for trails bringing estimated total miles of roads to 150 and 49 miles of trails. The City of Muskego also continues to maintain low taxes with a 2019 tax rate of \$4.50 which is lower than five years ago (2014) at \$4.91.

In recent newsletters you would have seen reference to the Dark Store issue. State Legislators created a special committee to study the matter and we hope that the end result will be fair to homeowners and small businesses. Market adjustments are taking place and will continue to do so with regard to online shopping sweeping the Nation. In some cases store fronts are downsizing while others are closing and generates market adjustments.

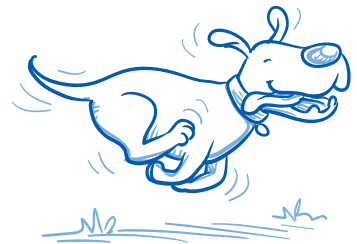
TAX PAYMENTS (Real Estate Taxes Only):

MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF



It just doesn't seem right that I am writing the spring newsletter when it is 7 degrees outside and the wind-chill is -13 degrees. Nonetheless, spring will be coming hopefully sooner than later. As spring arrives, so do outdoor activities and I will again remind you of the usual items;

- **NO burning of garbage or construction materials (Ordinance 191-24).** Remember that most neighbors won't appreciate opening their windows for the first time in spring, only to have their house fill up with smoke from your leaf burning. That could generate a call to us.
- **NO storing, parking or leaving unattended any disassembled, inoperable, unlicensed, junked, wrecked, or abandoned motor vehicle, except in an enclosure which houses such property from public view (Ordinance 248-6.P).** Avoid a visit from us and help keep our community looking tidy.
- **Special Event Application and Planning Guide are available at Muskego.org (Ordinance 305-1)**

Drivers should be mindful of distractions while driving. Vehicles are now full of distractions such as GPS, dashboards that look like airplane cockpits, our cellphones, rocking stereos, televisions and more. Technology is handy but can be very distracting. Please pay attention to the road and driving so you get to your destination safely and drive the speed limit.

The use of our cities path system also increases in spring. Be mindful of pedestrians and bicyclists using the paths and crossing the roads. Vehicles are required to stop for pedestrians/bicyclists actively crossing the road at a marked/striped crosswalk. At a controlled crosswalk the traffic signals will dictate when pedestrians can cross.

The Muskego Police Department again offers programs for citizens to participate in as part of our community outreach and education initiative found in the Parks & Recreation Activity Guide and muskego.org. The following are some of programs we will be offering this year:

- **Citizen's Academy** – Begins March 12 from 7:00 – 10:00 PM
- **Hunter Safety** – Saturday, March 23 from 7:30 AM – 5:00 PM
- **Boater Safety** – Saturday & Sunday, April 27 & 28 from 8:00 AM – 2:00 PM
- **Safety City** – This preschool (ages 4-7) program creates a child-size city where children use big wheels to learn about road and pedestrian safety.
- **National Night Out** – August 1, 2019. A great family event designed to heighten crime and drug prevention awareness.

2. Here is a Facebook post from Community Resource Officer Jeff Sartorius:

The Muskego Police Department is also looking to create a comprehensive list/map of all businesses and residences within the city that are willing to provide us with access to their security/surveillance systems.

Here's how it will work: you or your neighbor has video/audio surveillance for your house or business. There was an incident that required police presence and investigations nearby. Officers are now looking for a suspect or suspect vehicle that may have been captured by your surveillance. By filling out the appropriate form, officers are able to see that you are in close proximity to the incident and may have valuable evidence pertaining to the incident from your surveillance. Officers make contact with you and ask for your assistance in obtaining said surveillance/possible evidence.

That's it! We are not infiltrating your security system, watching you do Tae Bo in your living room (if that's even a thing anymore), or violating any of your constitutional rights! We will not have access to the surveillance unless you give it to us! There are no obligations, the list simply let's investigating officers know you have it!

PARKS & RECREATION



Park Updates (2019)

- New signage will be installed along Trails, within Parks, and at Boat Launches.
- Little Muskego Lake Access points will receive new signs, boundary markers, picnic tables, garbage cans, and landscape cleanup for more attractive public access sites.
- New park pavilions will be installed at Idle Isle and Park Arthur.
- Split rail fence to delineate parking lot will be installed at Idle Isle.
- New playground set for Park Arthur.
- Kurth Park baseball field will get a new outfield fence and adjustment to playground set to ensure better drainage.
- Sandhill Park Pavilion and parking lot will have electrical service installed.
- Basketball court painting is scheduled for Lee Hubka Park, Schmidt Park, Old Town Hall, Bluhm Park, Moorland Park, and Park Arthur.
- Look for potential Beer Garden Events and Times in Spring, Summer, and Fall at Veterans Park.
- Annual parking pass will be available for parking at Idle Isle Park. Pass sales will start in April at City Hall.

Trails & Conservation Areas Updates

- New segments of Martin Drive Trail and Racine Avenue Trail opened in the Fall of 2018.
- Segments of the WE Energies Trail received a new layer of asphalt millings in the Fall of 2018 with additional segments to be completed in 2019 as DPW staff time becomes available.
- Engel Conservation Driveway and Badertscher Preserve Parking Lot received a new layer of asphalt millings in Fall 2018.

Annual Park Operations Timetable

- Restrooms open May 1 with closure on September 30 for Idle Isle, Lions, Kurth, Bluhm (south side), and Veterans Memorial Park.
- Restrooms at Park Arthur open year round.
- Pay Stations at Idle Isle will be turned on April 1; all launch and parking fees at Idle Isle commence April 1.

- Bay Lane Drive from Woods Road to Janesville Road is scheduled for reconstruction from Spring 2019 to Fall 2019.
- Hillendale Drive from Racine Avenue to College Avenue is scheduled for a reconstruction in 2020.

Planning & Development

Many changes have occurred on the City Hall & Police Department campus since mid-2017. The New City Hall opened its doors on July 9, 2018 and the new Police Department is expected to open in late Fall 2019. The new Police building will better meet the needs of the Police Department into the future.

Relating to other development in the community, there has been no slow down with regard to development in the City. The Glen at Pellmann Farm construction has begun on the first building within this condo development located along Woods Road. The development features 34 condo units separated into 11 two-unit buildings and 3 four-unit buildings that also includes a clubhouse and a pool.

The Will Rose development located along Janesville Road includes multi-family development with anticipated construction to be soon. The first phase of this development will include the construction of a 51 unit apartment building, the second phase will include a 39 unit apartment building, and the third phase will include a clubhouse.

Single-family subdivisions are also in the planning stages. The Waters of Lake Denoon located off Crowbar Drive on the west shore of Lake Denoon will contain 15 new single-family lots being developed by Jewell Homes. Muskego Lakes Estates located off Ryan Road just north of Muskego Lakes Country Club will contain 28 new single-family lots being developed by Burbuck Builders.

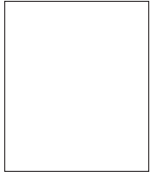
